understanding the case as it is presented to you. 1 2 Mr. Moawad, would you like to make an 3 opening_statement? MR. MOAWAD : I would, your Honor. 4 5 (PEOPLE'S EXHIBIT NO. 2 б 7 MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION) 8 9 (TAPE PLAYED) 10 11 MR. MOAWAD: What you just heard was Beverly-Rhoads-calling 911 on March 20th, 2008, to 12 13 tell them the murderer is Nathan Medina. 14 You are going to hear from Ms. Rhoads. 15 is going to tell you the same thing she told the police that day. She is going to tell you the 16 murderer is Nathan Medina. 17 18 So how did we get here? 19 Ms. Rhoads is going to tell you that she and her family have been friends of the defendant's 20 21 family for almost 20 years. 22 She is going to tell you that they went on family vacations together. They went camping. 23 24 They celebrated holidays together. 25 She is going to tell you that in 2003 she 26 hired the defendant's stepfather to do an addiction on her home. 27 28 She is going to tell you that the defendant

himself did the electrical work on the addition.

She is going to tell you that she paid the defendant's stepfather \$116,000 for what she was told would be a three to four-month project, and that more than 18 months later the project still wasn't done.

She is going to tell you that she had to hire another contractor to come in and finish the job and that he had to tear out most of the work that had already been done in order to complete the job.

She is going to tell you that in order to recover her money she filed a lawsuit against the defendant's stepfather.

The defendant's stepfather filed a counterclaim, countersuit against Ms. Rhoads.

Ms. Rhoads' attorney filed a motion to dismiss that counterclaim, but before the Court could even rule on that motion to dismiss, the defendant's stepfather, seeing the writing on the wall, dismissed the countersuit himself.

Less than a month later the defendant took it upon himself to resolve the issue and went in to Mrs. Rhoads' house and attacked her and executed her son.

Ms. Rhoads is going to tell that you on March 20th, 2008, she was sitting at her home office working. The home office that is in the

addition.

She is going to tell you that the power went out, so she called to her son, Joshua who was sitting in the front bedroom watching TV. They quickly figured out that the power wasn't out to the entire house, but just to the addition. So he told her to go check the breaker box in the laundry room, which is also part of the addition.

She went in and looked at the breaker box and all of the breakers appeared to be in the correct position, so she called to Joshua again.

And this time Joshua came down the hall to help his mom.

As he began looking at the breaker switch Ms. Rhoads heard the front door open and somebody come in. So she walked down the hall to see who it was.

When she got to the front door she saw the defendant, a man she has known for nearly 20 years standing inside her front door. She is going to tell you that he was wearing a black cap and a black jacket or black sweatshirt.

She is going to tell you that the defendant sprayed her with some sort of chemical weapon; that she screamed and ran down the hallway; that the defendant chased her down the hallway, and as she passed the laundry room caught up to her and tried to grab her and she broke free.

She ran back to the laundry room to whatever safety was afforded by her 25-year-old son.

As she slid past her son into the laundry room Joshua Rhoads also saw the defendant, and said "you have got to be kidding me, get the fuck out of my house", and slammed the door.

Now, Sam Rhoads and Beverly Rhoads were both in the laundry room and the defendant was stuck outside. Joshua barricaded the door with his body to try and prevent the defendant from getting in, but within seconds bullets starting piercing the laundry room door, one of them entering Joshua's wrist and exiting the other side.

Joshua turned to his mom and said "call 911, I have been shot".

Ms. Rhoads picked up the phone in the laundry room and started dialing 911 even as she was getting splinters from the pieces of wood that were being gouged out of the laundry room floor by the bullets as they impacted.

She then climbed up on a counter on the side of the laundry room and hid there behind some clothes.

You heard her talking to 911 saying "we are being murdered" and then she stops talking. She stops talking because the defendant breaks down the laundry room door. He turns it into a Dutch door.

The open slams open, but the bottom that Joshua remains barricading himself with his body stays closed.

The defendant reaches over and executes Joshua with two shots to his head.

Ms. Rhoads can't see what the defendant is doing. She hears the shots. She see his hand. She then hears him walking around the house, but doesn't know what he's doing or where he is at any given time. She is begging the police to come help her. She is terrified of moving for fear that the defendant will figure out that she is still in the laundry room.

She lays on top of that counter for more than an hour, until the police are finally able to come to the window of the laundry room and help her out through the window.

You're going to hear from Sean Mendell.

Mr. Mendell is going to tell you that Joshua Rhoads
was his best friend. He's going to tell you that
he knows Ms. Rhoads and that he lives in a cottage
in the back of Ms. Rhoads' house.

He's going to tell you that on March 20th, 2008, he was in the cottage in the backyard at 1110 Boulevard Way in Walnut Creek. He was back there with his girlfriend at the time Mariele Longfellow. He is going to tell you she was watching TV and he was working on his computer.

When they heard clanging noises, noises that he describes as clanking or clanging. They didn't know what it was, but they knew it was unusual, so they looked out the window of the cottage into the backyard.

Mr. Mendell is going to tell you that he saw Ms. Rhoads' dog in the backyard and saw that the gate from the backyard to the driveway to the street was open. And not knowing what happened inside the house moments earlier, all he knew is he didn't want to be blamed for the dog getting out.

So he walked outside into the backyard and started walking around to the gate to close it.

And as he did that he heard the sliding glass door from the master bedroom, Beverly Rhoads' room to the backyard open. And out of it stepped a man wearing a black beanie, a black three-quarter length leather coat, trench coat, black pants and black shoes.

At the time Mr. Mendell was wondering who that was. And he said in no uncertain terms, "who the hell are you", at which point the man dressed in black walked up to him and pointed a firearm at his head.

Mr. Mendell crouched down and began bobbing and weaving trying to keep the gun pointed away from his head. The man with the gun kept demanding

"where's Sam, where's Sam Rhoads" a name that Beverly goes by.

Sean says "I don't know" and the man with the gun fired a round, narrowly missing Sean's head.

Sean looked and could see out of the corner of his eye that the gun, the slide of the gun was jammed back, or was in the back position and that the man with the gun was fiddling with the gun.

The man with the gun said "give me some money".

Sean stood up and walked to the cottage to get his wallet to give it to the man. The man walked behind him.

As Sean was looking for his wallet he turned around and saw the man standing in the doorway with the gun with the slide back in the normal position now pointed at he and Mariele Longfellow, his girlfriend at the time, in the cottage.

Sean Mendell is going to tell you that the man with the gun looked nervous, particularly more nervous when he saw that there was yet another person in the cottage. Mr. Mendell is going to tell you that he found his wallet and turned to give his money to the man with the gun, the man with the gun was gone.

You are going to hear from Annie Zeiph.

And Annie Zeiph is going to tell you that just

- 7 She is going to tell you that when she was

- 11 baggie sweatshirt with a hood that was not over his
- 12 | head walking down the street.
- She looked at a photo lineup of six
- 14 | separate, but similar photographs and pointed out
- 15 the defendant as the person that she saw walking
- 16 down the street that day.
- 17 You are going to hear from Olga Gonzalez.
- 18 Ms. Gonzalez lives at the corner of Del Hambre
- 19 | Circle and Dewing Lane about a block from
- 20 Ms. Rhoads' house.
- 21 She is going to tell you that shortly after
- 22 | 10:00 o'clock she looked out her side sliding glass
- 23 door and saw parked on the street an unoccupied
- 24 | black pickup truck with gold and black writing that
- 25 | had words to the effect of Fortuna Ford.
- 26 You are going to hear that the next day the
- 27 | defendant's black Ford F-150 pickup truck was found
- 28 abandoned in Pacheco with black and gold paper

plates that said Fortune Ford.

You're going to hear that 40 minutes prior to this murder the defendant made a phone call from his cell phone.

You're going to hear that the defendant's cell phone was connecting to the AT&T network from a cell site less than half a mile from Ms. Rhoads' house.

You're going to hear from Detective Andy
Brown of the Walnut Creek Police Department. He's
going to tell you that slightly more than 12 hours
after this murder he was conducting a search
warrant at the defendant's house. He's going to
tell you that he found 129 rounds of 9mm
ammunition, a black three-quarter length trench
coat, leather trench coat, and he is also going to
tell you that he did not find a 9mm Kel-Tec P-11
handgun that is registered to the defendant's
girlfriend, live-in girlfriend, Jenny Hamilton.

You are going to hear from Detective Tracy
Reese of the Walnut Creek Police Department. She
is going to tell you that she used a gunshot
residue kit to collect particles, or potential
particles off of the cuffs of the sleeves of that
black leather trench coat that it was found at the
defendant's house.

You are going to hear from Beth Hopkins who is going to tell you that she processed the

defendant's pickup truck and used a GSR kit, or several, to process both the outside and inside door handles to the defendant's truck, the steering wheel and the gear shift.

You're going to hear from Margaret Kaleuati from the Los Angeles County Coroner's Office where all of Contra Costa County's gunshot residue kits are sent for analysis. She is going to tell you that there were particles that are characteristic of gunshot residue on the left cuff of that black leather three-quarter length trench coat found in the defendant's house, on the inside of the door handle to the defendant's truck, and on the steering wheel of the defendant's truck.

She is also going to tell you that there was particles that are consistent with, although not characteristic with, of gunshot residue on the right cuff and the gear shift of the jacket and truck respectively.

You're going to hear from Terence Wong of the Contra Costa County Crime Lab. He's going to tell you that the 129 rounds of ammunition in the defendant's house in the master bedroom under the defendant's bed are identical in caliber, manufacturer and composition to the rounds used to commit this murder.

He's also going to tell you that based on a ballistic examination of the markings left on the

rounds found at the defendant's house that eight of those 129 rounds were loaded into and ejected from the exact same firearm that the rounds found at the scene were chambered in.

You're going to hear from Detective Baca, who is the computer guru at the Walnut Creek Police Department. He's going to tell you that in analyzing the defendant's computers he found that the defendant had a carefully crafted plan in the guise of helping haw enforcement deal with drug dealers of going into a target's house and immobilizing that target with a chemical weapon and a wrap tie.

Detective Baca is also going to tell you that that plan contemplated the use of a firearm, if necessary, to overcome any resistance by the defendant's target.

Ladies and gentlemen, this case started with Beverly Rhoads telling you the murderer is Nathan Medina. And at the close of all of the evidence I am confident that you will tell the world that the murderer is Nathan Medina when you return a verdict of guilty on all counts.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Mr. Manoukian, would you like to make an opening statement at this time?

MR. MANOUKIAN: I would.
