emergency last night, his in-laws in San Jose were

both taken to the hospital and he is anxious to get

down there to be with his family.

He said he had been up since 3:00 o'clock this morning and waiting to come here because he didn't feel that he should leave town without checking with the Court.

He has now arrived, he has been sitting out in the hall waiting this morning. He at first said that he could stay until 12:00, but really needed to leave here at 12:00, although when he got here he said that he would like to leave as soon as possible.

THE COURT: So my intent is to ask (JUROR NUMBER 8) to come in just himself so there is some modicum of privacy, and inquire of the situation and the scheduling and so forth and his desire to be with his in-laws and then after hearing from him I'll excuse him, hear from counsel and then make a decision on how to proceed.

Any suggestions otherwise?

MR. MANOUKIAN: Sounds like an appropriate procedure, your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay.

know the rules or anything like that, so that is why I came in to find out. And I was hoping they could call the other jurors to say, well, do not come in today because this has happened. That is what I was hoping, but, of course, it is up to the Court to decide.

So to be truthful I do not -- I know I cannot give 100 percent. And again, I do want to be fair to Mr. Medina.

MR. MANOUKIAN: But you feel Monday that you would be in a position you could do that?

(JUROR NUMBER 8): Yes, because then I am going to know what exactly happened, what is going to happen, what is the status, is this like somebody else, I do not know if you have children or married or anything, you worry until you know absolutely.

Then also all of a sudden the worry goes way down. And so sure I will be fine for Monday.

MR. MOAWAD: Well, your Honor, I have some concerns that he's frankly going to be available next week, not to mention I know that we lose (JUROR NUMBER 11) at some point next week and I don't know how many of the other jurors. I think it's important that they -- I know that they were discussing making some accommodations for people at some point today, I don't know what those hours are, but I would hate to cut that even shorter today, as well as it appears that (JUROR NUMBER 8) would be distracted.

I guess ultimately my biggest concern would be that we do something to postpone deliberations, move it further away from argument where things are freshest in their minds, and then he ends up saying on Monday that he can't be here because it turns out the mother-in-law did have a stroke or whatever other reason, and if the -- if it's truly a heart attack and a stroke, I would imagine that one or both of them would remain in the hospital on Monday and there may be other things that need to be done. I don't know.

I appreciate his confidence that it would be less distracting for him once he knows, but there may be other practicalities that would interfere.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Manoukian, your position.

MR. MANOUKIAN: Well, your Honor, I would say this with a great amount of reluctance, but I certainly -- the defense's position is that I don't need to recite the tortured procedural history of this case was that we accommodate (JUROR NUMBER 8) in whatever manner we can. He is a seated juror, and from the defense perspective is an important part of the collective jury that we want to participate in deliberations. And I -- I say that understanding all of the ramifications of what that means.

I would just comment that he does seem confident that he will be here Monday.

I think that his comments about knowing what is going on and at least being able to be there for the initial discovery of what is going on to comfort his wife and to find out the situation will set his mind at least, and if certainly they are down there in the hospital there isn't anything that he necessarily can do. And he again felt confident that he would be available Monday, and would be able to concentrate Monday, and expressed a desire to participate. He said I want -- I would like to continue deliberating.

So those are the defense's positions on this newest development, your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

I am going to excuse (JUROR NUMBER 8) for

the deliberations on this case. It is clear to me that he is distraught, he is emotionally fragile.

3 It's absolutely clear to me he cannot deliberate

4 | today, although he is willing to do so if

5 necessary. I agree with him that it's virtually

6 impossible for him to deliberate in substance on

7 | this case.

I also appreciate and believe his belief that he will be available Monday, but I agree that that is a more uncertain future than any of us can predict. With two presumably elderly in-laws, they have been married 65 years, they have got to be up there, one with a heart attack and one with either stress, anxiety attack or a stroke, I don't think it's at all clear that he will be free on Monday. At that age, they tend to get worse before they get better.

I think it's too uncertain in light of the fact that we start losing jurors at the end of the day today and next week, I don't believe I can risk losing today's deliberations entirely.

So I'm going to excuse (JUROR NUMBER 8), pick among our alternates by lot and we will call in the alternate and instruct them to begin deliberations anew.

Sue, you haven't put names in yet, have you?

THE CLERK: I did.

THE COURT: 1. Okay. THE CLERK: Place the names in there, open 2 3 the box, spin the wheel. 4 Thank you. And alternate (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 1). 5 She was alternate in seat one of the alternates. 6 7 THE COURT: I'm going to ask (JUROR NUMBER 8 8) to come back in, and I'll thank him and instruct him, explain my reasons to him. MR. MOAWAD: Presumably the Court won't 10 need us for anything when she arrives, just as if 11 (JUROR NUMBER 8) had been there? 12 13 THE COURT: No, I have to instruct them to start deliberations all over again, so we'll have 14 to come in and bring the jury panel in. 15 16 MR. MANOUKIAN: I am sorry, we are --17 THE COURT: When (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 1) 18 gets here, I'm going to bring all of the jurors in to instruct them to start deliberations anew, read 19 the standard substitution instruction. 20 So you will need to be available in a half hour, whenever 21 22 (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 1) gets here. THE COURT: Okay. The record will reflect that all parties are present.

(JUROR NUMBER 8) has returned.

(JUROR NUMBER 8), I have given some thought to your session, and it's my conclusion, first, that it would be completely unfair to ask you to deliberate today, both to you and the parties. I don't think we can ask that of anyone, that would be asking you to do the impossible.

Secondly, I'm going to excuse you from further service, recognizing your willingness to serve next week and I very much appreciate, that it's a wonderful attitude and one that we encourage, but for accommodation factors I think it's best that we excuse you and we will bring in an alternate juror, because I don't want you to have this weighing on your mind all weekend if things are not as rosy Monday as you would hope and you feel the pressure to come back since you had committed, and I don't want you to be in that position, I want you to be with your in-laws as long as you would like to be.

(JUROR NUMBER 8): Thank you.

THE COURT: And I just think it's too much to ask of you under the circumstances.

So I'm excusing you now, and you are welcome to head to San Jose immediately.

And I do need to tell you that you remain

under the prohibitions not to discuss the case with anybody, obviously, not with any of the deliberating jurors or alternates or anybody else.

When the case is completed, Sue will call you and let you know that it's completed and what the decision is, if there is a decision, and at that point then you will be free of all of our admonitions and you will be free to talk to anybody about the case, if you want to, it's entirely up to you. That is, the other jurors, the lawyers, anybody you want.

But until that point we need to ask that you maintain the rules that I have been placing you under.

I want to wish your in-laws the best of health. I want to thank you also for being so conscientious to come in. Many people would have said I'm out of here.

(JUROR NUMBER 8): Right.

THE COURT: You said I'll deal with it, and I would have understood that completely, but your conscientious participation as a juror is very much appreciated, but I don't think that it's fair to ask you to continue.

So thank you for coming in and good luck with your folks and your in-laws.

Thank you for your service.
