1 MR. MANOUKIAN: I was no help, sorry. 2 THE COURT: Well, I would like to get the 3 evidence completed today. So, normally, I would 4 consider calling it a day and doing the last 5 witness tomorrow morning, but we will have a full 6 day tomorrow. I want to get this to you tomorrow. 7 So we have some issues to discuss, scheduling 8 primarily. (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 4), I know that 9 10 tomorrow begins to be a problem for you. Without 11 prying into your personal life, just give me an idea of the nature of the problem so I can take it 12 into consideration. 13 Are you traveling out of town, that type of 14 thing? 15 16 ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 4: No, I'm not 17 traveling out of town. When I first started the case my position was ended at my -- at my current 18 19 company, and then they wanted to bring me back on with a new position, but they put me back on 20 21 starting tomorrow. THE COURT: Is it safe to assume this is an 22 23 important job for you? ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 4: Safe to say, 24 25 I -- yes. THE COURT: You would be working full-time 26

from tomorrow on?

1. THE COURT: Okay. The others, I know we 2 had several who had concerns starting Friday. And 3 let me start out, preface this by saying I'm asking 4 you because I intend to make every effort not to 5 interfere with anybody's problems, since we have grossly underestimated the length of the trial and 6 7 caused you to be in this problem. 8 The reason I'm asking these questions is so 9 I can find out a way to work around your schedules. Leave it at that for 17 now. 18 (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 1), you also had 19 something this Friday, or was it starting Friday and beyond? 20 21 ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 1: It was Friday, 22 but I have scheduled a replacement, so I am 23 okay. 24 THE COURT: Thank you. 25 So you are good Friday, or --Okay. Let me say the case, which I intend, 26 27 fully intend to get this case to you tomorrow.

predict how long deliberations will be beyond that, but, obviously, we will have to consider the 2 schedule. 3 Then, (ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 11), you also 4 5 had something, was it Friday and beyond or just Friday? 6 7 ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 11: It's Friday and most of next week. 8 9 THE COURT: Okay. Is that a travel type thing, work thing? 10 11 ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 11: Actually, three 12 flights, two that I have already changed. 13 THE COURT: We have already made you change it twice. 14 15 I got it. 16 Okay. If my notes are correct, that is everybody who mentioned so far that we have 17 problems this week. 18 What I would like to do is ask you to stick 19 around to get the last witness completed this 20 21 afternoon, because then once we do that things are kind of more in my control, so I can control the 22 23 timing a little better. 24 As far as jury instructions, tomorrow morning, I believe, assuming all of the witnesses 25 are finished today, we would start right out with 26 jury instructions, which takes about an hour, then 27 28 go to closing arguments, and it will be my hope

and expectation that we would complete those, and the jury will be to the -- the case will be to the jury tomorrow.

After that then the alternates, of course,

would be on call, not required here at the courtroom, but still necessary, assuming that you'll be excluded.

(ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 4) again, is -- I will have to talk to --

ALTERNATE JUROR NUMBER 4: Yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: -- I have to consult with counsel on that.

And again, we'll just take it day-by-day beyond that.

I think what we should do now is recess for the 35 minutes, 40 minutes real time. As soon as the witness gets here, so if you want to start hanging around about ten minutes to 3:00 or five to 3:00, as soon as the witness is here we will start so that we can complete it as soon as possible. Then once the witnesses are complete we will recess for the day.

In the meantime, counsel and I have work to do on the exhibits and the jury instructions. We have been working on those before you get here, over the lunch and after you leave, but until all of the evidence is in I can't put the jury instructions in the absolute final shape because

they depend on what the evidence is.

So we are getting close to that time and we will be using the time between now and 3:00 and after you leave today to get those in final so they will be ready to go out of the box tomorrow morning.

So with that I'll give you folks a half hour recess, and remind you not to discuss the case.

And we'll make every effort to start as close to 3:00 as we can.

Yes, sir.

JUROR NUMBER 8: Due to jurors possibly going to be out, and another juror stated possibly next week, will we not be coming and at all next Friday, or will we be coming in for one day or two weeks from today we could be or a day or two, how does that work?

THE COURT: Reasonable question, (JUROR NUMBER 8), and it would be my tentative thoughts, and I'm very interested in hearing your thoughts because it's your lives, my suggestion would be to plan on not deliberating Friday, because of the --we have two conflicts, but to continue next week on Monday and keep deliberating until a verdict is reached continuing Monday if you are still deliberating is my most likely request of you.

So it may be that we have to substitute

THE COURT: And (JUROR NUMBER 11's) schedule may change, in other words, he may choose to deliberate Friday. So I think it's premature to excuse him at this point, but your point is well-taken.
