approximately 1 and a half hours before Mr. Mendell viewed a photo lineup containing the defendant, Detective McColgin had the following exchange with Mr. Mendell:

McColgin: Do you know uh, do you know (Nathan)?

Mendell: Yes.

McColgin: Did you recognize the person as (Nathan)?

Mendell: Uh, the problem is I haven't seen (Nathan).

McColgin: Okay.

Mendell: What happened is they showed me a picture of (Nathan), (unintelligible). (Unintelligible).

McColgin: She positive - the mom positively (unintelligible) - she's sure it's (Nathan).

Mendell: Is she?

McColgin: Yeah, (unintelligible) (Nathan). (Unintelligible).

While Detective McColgin informed Mr. Mendell of the fact that another witness identified "Nathan Medina" as the attacker, which depending on the circumstances may be deemed suggestive, the standard remains that there be a "substantial likelihood of irreparable misidentification." Again, the Court must weigh the corrupting effect of the suggestive identification procedure
